About Us







In 2026, TRI-CAP proudly marks 60 years of serving families in our community. For six decades, we have walked with families as they worked to build stable, thriving futures for themselves.

As we reflect on this milestone, 2025 stands out as a powerful reminder of why our work matters—and why it must continue.

Our mission has always been to walk alongside families in partnership. We recognize the strength, resilience, and determination they already bring. When barriers limit access to opportunity, our role is to help remove those barriers and expand pathways forward.

A Holistic Approach to Stability

Since our founding in 1966, the challenges facing low-income families have evolved, but the need for stability, dignity, and opportunity has remained constant.

In 2025, families continued to face rising housing costs, unstable employment, limited access to childcare, healthcare barriers, and transportation challenges. Over time, these pressures compound, making self-sufficiency difficult to achieve without consistent, coordinated support.

Refined over six decades, our approach remains holistic, relationship-centered, and rooted in respect. We recognize that poverty is not a personal failure but often the result of systemic inequities. Families are the experts in their own lives. Our role is to listen, respond thoughtfully, and foster an environment where they feel valued and heard.

Every service we offer is built on partnership. Families set their goals, and we provide the structure, tools, and encouragement to help them move forward.

While outcomes and metrics tell one part of the story, the spirit behind the work tells another. To better understand the character of our impact in 2025, we invited our team to share the words that defined their experience serving families.

The result is more than a collection of adjectives — it is a reflection of our culture, our approach, and the principles that have sustained us for six decades.




In the Spotlight: TRI-CAP Highlights from 2025

STORIES OF GROWTH AND EMPOWERMENT

All clients have provided permission to tell their stories.

A TRI-CAP **Housing** client is celebrating stability, independence, and renewed hope through the IDA (Individual Development Account) Program. Read Alexia's story "From Struggle to Stability" on the following page.

Thanks to regular perinatal depression screening, and a great deal of support and compassion from their Family Support Specialist, a **Healthy Families Program** parent was able to begin treatment for depression and anxiety, enabling them to be a better parent for their baby.

Weatherization helped an elderly woman and her daughter stay cool and comfortable in their mobile home. Before, their only window air conditioner couldn't cool the whole house, so the daughter had to sleep on the living room couch. After installing a heat pump furnace and air conditioner, she can now sleep comfortably in her own bedroom—bringing relief, comfort, and peace of mind to the whole family!

Family Planning had a teenager present with her parent seeking contraception. Our Nurse Practitioner was able to counsel her on all contraceptive methods and she was able to choose the best method for her and they were able to start it that same day.

In addition to talking about birth control, the Nurse Practitioner talked about what a healthy relationship looks like, what coercion and peer pressure looked like, and the value of abstinence. They also talked about how important it is to have parents or other reliable adults that she can talk with about anything and everything, avoiding smoking and vaping and how to care for her body. The Nurse Practitioner talked about the patient's goals for the future and the Nurse Practitioner encouraged her to pursue them.

A TRI-CAP **Head Start Preschool** parent was going through the difficult process of a cancer diagnosis. Their family was worried about their monthly utility and mortgage payments. Their family advocate forwarded resources like <https://duboiscountyresources.org/>. Three weeks after receiving surgery, the parent came to TRI-CAP and shared that her recovery is going very well! She said she would not have to go through chemotherapy and thanked me for providing resources to help them pay this month's mortgage and other bills. She said she looks forward to being released by her doctor and returning to work soon.

From Struggle to Stability Through TRI-CAP's IDA Program

"My name is Alexia S., and I am proud to share how TRI-CAP's Individual Development Account (IDA) Matched Savings Program changed my life.

I struggled with substance use from the age of thirteen and battled addiction for over a decade. In 2016, when I became pregnant with my first daughter, I made the decision to get sober. By 2017, I was newly in recovery, a young mother, and working part-time while living with my mother. That's when I was introduced to TRI-CAP's IDA program.

The IDA program gave me the chance to save toward a future I never thought possible. TRI-CAP's staff walked me through every step, from building savings habits to completing financial literacy classes. At first, I doubted myself. College and homeownership seemed completely out of reach for someone like me. But with their encouragement and guidance, I started to dream bigger.

While in the program, I enrolled in school, eventually earning my Associate of Applied Science in Human Services with a technical certificate in Addiction Studies, graduating magna cum laude. I went on to complete my Bachelor of Social Work, also magna cum laude, and am now in a Master of Social Work program. TRI-CAP also supported me as I faced another huge milestone—buying a home. With their help, I learned about mortgages, insurance, and budgeting, and in June 2020, my husband and I purchased our first home. Today we have about \$60,000 in equity.

Our home has become more than just a house—it is the heart of our family life. It's where friends and family gather for celebrations, where my kids' friends come for sleepovers, and where our door is always open. We love cooking meals together, hosting cookouts, and filling our home with laughter and community. This is something I once thought I'd never have, and now it's the center of our lives.

Since purchasing our home and receiving my college degrees, I have spent several years working as a case manager in a mental health and substance use agency, where I was able to give back by helping others pursue housing and stability. I even reconnected with TRI-CAP to introduce many of my clients to the IDA program—the same program that once helped me. Though I have since stepped back from direct practice to focus on graduate school, that experience shaped me as both a professional and a person.



Today, I am over nine years in recovery (soon to celebrate 10 years in March 2026). I am a wife, a mother of two healthy children, and a homeowner. I had a beautiful wedding, and my husband and I now enjoy a steady income, reliable vehicles, and the stability we once only dreamed of. He is considering opening his own business in the next few years! I have plans of becoming a licensed clinical social worker (LCSW) and dreams of owning my own practice as well.

Because of the IDA program, my family and I have stability, independence, and hope for the future. We are raising our children in a safe and loving home, surrounded by opportunity.

This program didn't just help me reach financial goals—it gave me the confidence and foundation to build a future I once thought impossible. I am deeply grateful for TRI-CAP, for staff like Tammy and Justin, and for the funding that makes programs like this possible. My story is living proof of the long-term impact these resources can have. I hope funding continues so that countless other families can achieve the same stability and success."

The **Wagon Works** location features 56 affordable housing units designed for both seniors and families, combining comfort, accessibility, and convenience. Located in the heart of Huntingburg (Dubois County), these well-maintained homes provide residents with safe, welcoming spaces to live and thrive.

With a focus on affordability and quality, Wagon Works supports individuals and families in maintaining stability and a high quality of life within a vibrant community setting.

Investing in Community Through Affordable Housing

Thanks to a generous land donation from Brenda Buehler, an exciting new project is underway to construct a quality single-family home for a low-income resident of Pike County. This initiative will provide a safe, affordable housing option designed to meet the needs of a working family seeking stability. The home will feature a practical layout, modern amenities, and energy-efficient construction to help keep long-term living costs manageable. By expanding access to attainable homeownership, the project aims to strengthen the community and create lasting opportunity for a local resident.

COMMUNITY IMPACT ✦ HOUSING SERVICES

The **Energy Assistance Program** provides critical financial support to low-income households, helping them keep essential utility services active—especially during the winter months when heating costs can be a heavy burden.

TRI-CAP supports clients every step of the way, from intake and application guidance to processing submissions. Once approved, payments are made directly to utility providers, ensuring families stay warm and safe without interruption. Designed to reduce the stress of utility bills, the program safeguards vulnerable households during the colder season.

In 2025, TRI-CAP's Energy Assistance Program helped **1,969 families**, including elderly, veteran, and disabled households, maintain reliable heating and essential services.

The TRI-CAP **Emergency Food and Shelter Assistance Program** helps families facing unexpected crises. Vouchers provide rent support, home repairs, food, and utilities, giving families immediate relief and restoring stability.

In 2025, the program provided immediate relief to **10 families**, helping them avoid long-term hardship and rebuild stability.

Individual Development Accounts help low-income Hoosiers strengthen their financial futures. The program encourages savings, provides access to financial education, and offers a 3-to-1 matched savings opportunity, empowering individuals and families to increase financial stability. In 2025, **5 families** participated in TRI-CAP's Individual Development Accounts program.

TRI-CAP's **Mortgage Foreclosure Assistance Services** provides crucial support to homeowners at risk of losing their homes. Through personalized guidance and direct collaboration with mortgage lenders, the program helps families explore options such as loan modifications, repayment plans, or other solutions that can prevent foreclosure. By intervening early and providing expert assistance, TRI-CAP empowers homeowners to navigate complex financial challenges, maintain stability, and protect their most valuable asset—their home. In 2025, this program helped **83 families** stay in their homes, preserving not only shelter but also peace of mind and security for their families.

COMMUNITY IMPACT ✨ FAMILY HEALTH SERVICES

Family Planning empowers individuals to make informed choices about if and when to have children, including pregnancy spacing and birth control options. TRI-CAP's Family Planning clinics in Jasper and Evansville provide essential health services for individuals of reproductive age, serving patients regardless of insurance status. Services are offered on a sliding fee scale based on income and family size, and all forms of health insurance are accepted.



In 2025, **550 unduplicated patients** received confidential, personalized care through our services, leading to meaningful outcomes such as:

- Improved health and well-being for women and men
- Stronger, healthier family communication
- Early identification and prevention of disease



Healthy Families is a voluntary home visiting program dedicated to helping parents create safe, nurturing homes where children can thrive. The program provides supportive, education-based services that promote positive parenting and healthy child development.

Available at no cost to eligible families in Dubois, Gibson, Pike, Spencer, and Warrick Counties, services include parenting guidance and support, encouragement of routine medical care, developmental screenings for infants and children, and connections to additional community resources.

In 2025, **80 families** were served by:

- **710 Home Visits**
- **42 Home Assessments**
- **72 Physical and Social-Emotional Developmental Screens**

COMMUNITY IMPACT ✦ WEATHERIZATION SERVICES

The [Weatherization Assistance Program](#) helps low-income households make their homes safer, more comfortable, and more energy-efficient. By offering energy-saving upgrades and safety improvements, it reduces heating and cooling costs while addressing potential hazards—helping families save money and enjoy a healthier, more affordable home.



In 2025, TRI-CAP's Weatherization Assistance Program helped **37 homes** become safer, healthier, and more energy-efficient, resulting in an average 25% reduction in utility costs for residents. Upgrades included enhanced insulation to maintain steady indoor temperatures year-round, furnace maintenance or replacement to ensure safe and efficient heating, and the installation of LED bulbs to maximize energy savings while keeping homes well-lit.

By improving living conditions and reducing monthly costs, the program supports low-income families in maintaining comfort, financial stability, and a higher quality of life.

The [Home Safety and Comfort Program](#) provides affordable weatherization services to homeowners of all income levels, helping make homes safer, more comfortable, and energy-efficient. Services include sealing windows and doors, improving insulation, installing energy-saving lighting, and performing furnace maintenance—measures that reduce energy costs and maintain steady indoor temperatures year-round. By addressing both efficiency and safety, the program helps families create healthier living spaces and ease financial burdens.



In 2025, TRI-CAP provided these energy-saving improvements to a local homeowner, helping to enhance comfort, reduce utility costs, and create a safer, more efficient living environment.

TRI-CAP's Home Safety and Comfort Program continues to support local homeowners with energy-saving improvements that make a meaningful difference in daily life.

COMMUNITY IMPACT ✦ HEAD START PRESCHOOL

TRI-CAP's Head Start Preschool is a comprehensive early childhood development program for children ages 3 to 5 from low-income families. Designed to nurture physical, social, emotional, and cognitive growth, the program lays a strong foundation for lifelong learning. Offered at no cost, Head Start Preschool builds on each child's strengths and unique experiences, providing individualized support tailored to their needs.



Recognizing that families are a child's first and most important teachers, Head Start Preschool actively involves parents and caregivers in the learning process. This holistic approach strengthens both the child's development and the home environment, promoting long-term growth and success.

Beyond classroom instruction, the program emphasizes social skills, healthy habits, and family engagement, preparing children for school and life. By fostering curiosity, confidence, and a love of learning, TRI-CAP Head Start Preschool empowers children to reach their full potential while supporting families in creating stable, nurturing homes.

In 2025, **287 children** received **1,253 hours** of classroom education (average per child), and **708 volunteers** contributed over **53,517 hours** of service.



BUILDING BRIDGES TO SUPPORT: 2025 REFERRAL IMPACT

Behind every referral is a person, a family, or a life taking a step toward stability. In 2025, the TRI-CAP team facilitated **12,753** referrals to services and resources, connecting clients with the support they need to thrive. From mental health counseling to housing assistance or job training, each referral opens the door to opportunities, guidance, and hope.

In **2025**, the total investment in TRI-CAP services exceeded **\$6,301,056** - resources directed toward strengthening families, promoting stability, and expanding opportunity throughout the community. On average, **\$1,928** in services were provided for each TRI-CAP client, reflecting a meaningful commitment to delivering individualized support that makes a measurable difference in people's lives.

2025 - TRI-CAP CLIENTS - REAL PEOPLE, REAL IMPACT

693 adult clients were employed - individuals heading to work each day, supporting their families and contributing to the strength of our local economy.

34 clients were veterans or active-duty service members - individuals who have served our country and continue contributing to our communities.

465 families owned their homes, creating safe spaces where children grow, and futures are built.

527 clients have pursued post-secondary education, including 2, 4, or more years of college - demonstrating a commitment to growth, career advancement, and brighter futures.

560 households received additional benefits alongside employment income - helping cover essential expenses and maintain stability.

938 households received Social Security Income - through retirement benefits, Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) - providing reliable support for essential needs.

609 individuals served reported living with a disabling condition - underscoring the need for accessible services and supportive resources.

1,121 clients were under the age of 18 - representing the children and youth whose well-being, education, and stability are central to building stronger families and a brighter future for the entire community.
